After the intermission, the Dithyra-

The Dithyrambic Singers, comprising mostly UCSI University music students, is one of the Malaysia's leading choral ensembles.

The group has made appearances at various international events, including the 2008 Busan Choral Festival and Competition in South Korea,

All the four main performers were under the tutelage of UCSI University lecturers, and have been awarded scholarships to pursue their Masters in Vocal Performance and Piano Accompaniment at the Birmingham Conservation in Britain.
