
LECTURERS' ADVICE TO STUDENTS FOR ONLINE LESSON PREPARATION



Lecturer from the Faculty of Applied Sciences

Students should plan their time and be disciplined in attending to pre-recorded lectures. If it is a live lecture, they should note the time of the lecture and attend as if it is a physical lecture. They should continue to be pro-active and ask or email the lecturer if anything is not clear during the online class.

It is important for students to have read or reviewed the lesson prior to the actual class session. This will enhance the students' understanding of the lesson. In addition, they can ask questions through chat rooms, without disturbing the class.

A good connection to the internet is important. The lecture videos serve as a back-up for students to review and revise.

Most of the time I have to deal with students getting disconnected from lessons because of poor WiFi. Nevertheless, students now need to show their understanding of the subject in the assignments that they have to do. So it is important to have good WiFi, learn how to read and follow instructions, learn to understand what you read in detail, learn independently, and don't be afraid to ask questions if something is confusing.

In case of disconnection from classes, students may personally make an appointment with respective lecturers to clarify the lecture parts which they missed.

This type of communication is really vital for online classses.

For online lessons, I believe it is important to prepare a test run of the platform before class hours. I start my class a little earlier so that students and I are familiar with the platform we will be using. So we do a trial. Once we are comfortable, it is easy to conduct the lectures. I explain to students that we need to do this until we get familiar with the process. My students are very co-operative and patient.

- Students are strongly encouraged to read the teaching notes uploaded on CN before the e-classes commence.
- Students are encouraged to type their questions in the chat box so that the lecturers can attend to the questions while not disturbing the flow of the lessons.
- Students are to take notes during e-classes.
- Students are to revisit areas they are not sure during breaks and ask questions to clear their doubts.
